Peak season for farm machinery on public roads

The peak seasons for farm machinery to use public roads are spring and fall. Because of higher speed limits on rural roads, collisions in rural areas tend to be more serious. The most frequent types of multi-vehicle collisions involving farm machinery include:

- Farm machinery being hit as it turns onto a public road
- Collision as a motorist attempts to pass farm machinery on the road
- Rear-end collision due to motorists miscalculating the rate at which they are approaching farm machinery

Defensive driving tips for motorists

- Be alert. Watch for farm vehicles on rural roads.
- **Keep your distance.** Stay at least 15 metres or five car-lengths back.
- Slow down. As soon as you see a slowmoving vehicle, slow down immediately. It's difficult to judge how slowly it's moving, especially at night.
- Be patient.
 - Do not assume a farm vehicle is pulling right to let you pass. Check the left side of the road for gates, driveways or any place a farm vehicle might turn left.
 - Do not assume the farmer can move aside to let you pass.
 - Do not pass until the road is clear of traffic and you are positive it is safe to pass.
- Make sure you're clear. When passing, make sure you can see the farm vehicle in your rear-view mirror before you change back into the right lane.

This fall, slow down and enjoy the drive! Don't let frustration lead you to make a decision that may cause you and others harm.

Pride of Strathcona Awards, Agricultural Leadership

Strathcona County annually recognizes individuals or groups for outstanding achievements and contributions to our community in a variety of categories.

This year, we congratulate Gary and Nancy Kiziak of Codiak Acres, and Kelsey Knott—winners in the Agricultural Leadership category—for their exceptional leadership in our agricultural community.

Codiak Acres

Over 27 years, Gary and Nancy Kiziak have expertly grown their business and gained international acclaim. Codiak Acres breeds and exports awardwinning Speckle Park Cattle. They are one of a few beef cattle breeds developed in Canada, and are the largest exporter of Speckle Park genetics in the country.

Their farm brings provincial, national and international visitors to Strathcona County to attend their famous cattle sales—held twice a year on the farm. Their success as cattle breeders is a source of great pride for the Kiziak family, as is the great number of friends they have made all over the world.

The family has also supported our local agricultural community in many ways. Gary was past president of the Canadian Speckle Park Cattle Association; their farm has hosted Open Farm Days; they sponsor 4H shows and volunteer and sponsor the UFA Classic in Josephburg; and they have been involved with the Fort Feeders Association and the Northlands Beef Committee Board. Their two sons, Cody and Devon, were members of the Fort Saskatchewan 4H Club and are long-time volunteers themselves.

What is mulching and why is it necessary?

Mulching removes trees and brush from ditches to improve traffic sightlines, allow proper drainage and ensure there is enough space for the snow plowed from roads in winter. A machine is used to shred trees and brush into chips that are left to naturally decompose over time.

I like the trees in front of my property; will these be mulched?

The County only mulches trees and brush within our right-of-way, typically five to seven metres from the road edge. Attention and care is given to conserving trees wherever possible. The County does not clear the entire right-of-way unless it is required for construction projects.

The County mulched my road in the fall and now that the snow is gone, it looks terrible.

Mulching does change the appearance of the ditch at first. Typically, these areas re-establish grass within the year and by mid-summer of the following year, the appearance improves. The County's annual mowing activities also help break down any debris that remains.

Deer mouse or white-footed mouse

The deer mouse or white-footed mouse is a species native





to this area. Their population tends to increase in wet years in response to vegetation and seed production.

At this time of year, the mice will explore buildings to inhabit over the winter and will contaminate the areas with feces and urine. You can discourage their investigations by keeping a clean yard. Toxicants and trapping devices may be purchased at hardware stores and farm supply outlets for control measures.

Deer mice may be carriers of the hantavirus so exercise caution during handling.
